
POPULATION ESTIMATES, MARCH QUARTER 2016

Summary

- During the year to March 2016, South Australia's Estimated Resident Population (ERP) increased by 0.6% (or 9,700 persons) to 1,706,500 people.
- Nationally, the ERP increased by 1.4% to 24,051,400 people.

Further Analysis

South Australia's population rose by 0.2% during the March quarter 2016, to be 0.6% higher than a year ago. Nationally, population rose by 0.4% in the March quarter 2016 and was 1.4% higher than a year earlier—see Chart 1.




Population growth over the year by state, from highest to lowest was: Victoria (1.9%), New South Wales (1.4%), the ACT and Queensland (both up 1.3%), Western Australia (1.2%), South Australia (0.6%), and Tasmania and the Northern Territory (both up 0.4%).

In the 12 months to March 2016 the largest contribution to South Australia's population growth came from net overseas migration, which totalled 9,400 persons, down 11% from the previous 12 months. Natural increase over the period totalled 6,200, down 9.1% from the previous 12 months. In the year to March 2016, there was a <u>net</u> interstate outflow of 5,900 people from South Australia, 98% higher than in the previous 12 months—see Chart 2.
